

## Categorisation of replies to Q64.

Notes: Q62 identified areas for possible designation as Local Green Space. Q64 asked people to identify other areas of land, buildings or parts of the town they would like to see protected.

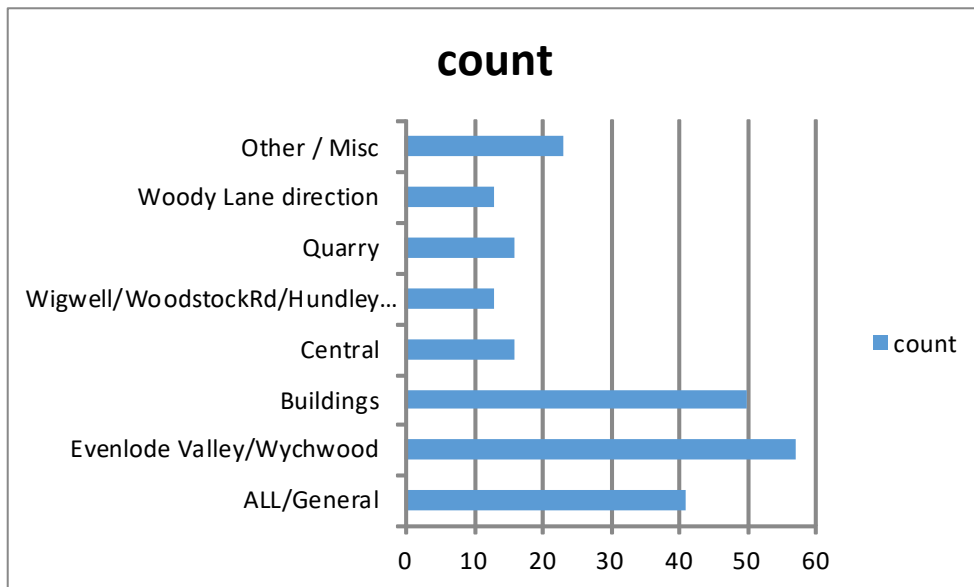
1. The question was primarily intended to address areas of open / undeveloped land for possible designation as LGS. Other features may be protected in other ways, eg as Listed Buildings or as part of the Conservation Area. They are not therefore listed separately below but are shown simply as 'buildings' or as 'covered elsewhere' as appropriate, as are areas of land covered in Q62.
2. Several comments were given in terms of views from, to or of particular areas or places. These have been categorised in terms of the areas of land immediately affecting those views, where it has been possible to identify them. Inevitably they are 'broad brush' and open to interpretation.
3. Several comments referred to named roads, footpaths or the approaches to the town. They have been categorised by name where given but most relate to land around or next to them rather than the road or approach itself. They are therefore best read with a prefix of 'Land at or adjoining...'
4. Inevitably some comments could fall into more than one category but have only been put into one to avoid double counting (as opposed to more than one separate comment from the same person).
5. The 'All' category means just that – all the open land within and surrounding Charlbury. It includes those who referred simply to the AONB.
6. Designation as LGS is subject to a number of criteria. A high number of comments does not therefore mean that a particular area of land will qualify for it but is an indication of the value placed on it by those responding to the survey.
